SEPTEMBER 2023

Once again, I find myself writing about Mental Health.

The levels of anxiety that are being endured by many during these post covid days with the added pressures of finance affect us in more ways than we perhaps realise. Some are able to cope, others not, but one thing we know with clarity is that there isn't enough help available to alleviate people's struggles. This itself adds more to our worry – where will it all end?

The Church is sometimes a guiding light! A place of welcome and 'something other', something people experience in differing ways – a place where people can find the holiness of God. I'm not sure the church is always like that these days, for even the church is affected by overwhelming mental health issues, although we endeavour to see our way through...

So where do we go?

"In my mind's eye, I saw myself standing in a wide-open space. Above me was an inky black sky. The darkness seemed over-whelming. But in that moment, God spoke into my heart! He showed me that even though the sky was incredibly dark, it was only in the dark that I could see the light of a thousand shimmering stars. I didn't hear an audible voice, but I knew God had seen me. I felt his love wrapping around me, showing me that there was hope even in the midst of despair and pain."

One in four people suffer from mental health problems: shame, fear, anger, despair, loneliness, and we still carry a sense of unwillingness to share our state of mind with others allowing these harmful emotions and feelings to travel with us daily...we then try to work at it ourselves self-medicating in order to mask what we feel too ashamed to share.

Perhaps healing truly begins when we feel at our most vulnerable, when we come to realise that we need help. That the darkness can be overcome by looking into it and seeing the light of Hope.

If the truth be known, none of us feel entirely at ease with who we are.

However, there is someone who knows you better than you know yourself, there is someone who has experienced the things you feel and more! There is someone who stared at the face of darkness and abandonment and came through. There is someone who loves and values you so much that He promises to fix you - when you are ready.

His Name is Jesus, He rescues us from all our feelings of shame, fear, anger, despair, loneliness and hopelessness. He brings meaning and purpose to our lives.

That's what He came to do 2000 years ago and it's a promise He keeps today and every day.

God bless you in Jesus' Name.

PARISH COUNCIL

The meeting on 10th July discussed residents' concerns about road speeds/inappropriate driving. The Chair of Highways had been asked for Cheshire East's stance on the introduction of speed limits. Borough Councillor James Pearson introduced himself and promised to support residents with their concerns. He emphasised complaints (highways/potholes and all others) MUST be registered with Council so they can be held to account.

Residents are to be asked to respond to the PC so proof of need for speed/safety management can be submitted. A suggestion was made for Wheelie Bin stickers to be used – highly visible each week.

Townley Villa planning; no comment was made.

It was agreed that the Jubilee Play Area is not age restricted, it is for all the community but should be used appropriately; the old sign has been taken down.

After a request from residents it was agreed to reduce the height of the trees bordering the play area which overshadow some gardens; the condition of the boundary wall will then be assessed.

A complaint was voiced about agricultural lorries accessing Pinsley Green through the village; more detail was requested to enable the PC to take this up with the operating company.

The next meeting will be Monday, 11th September. All residents are welcome to attend; however, if you wish to speak at the meeting please contact the Chair or the Clerk beforehand. Public speaking time is limited and only Councillors may take part in discussions/decisions.

MARBURY WI President Lynda Edwards welcomed members to the meeting on 11th July and introduced our speaker for the evening - Gill Adlington, from Middlewich. As well as talking about her subject - Painting for Everyone - Gill gave us a wonderful demonstration of her "wet-on-wet" oil painting technique which resulted in her completing a beautiful landscape in less than an hour! Gill told us she had always wanted to paint, but had struggled and in fact had given up for a time, until - many years ago - she had discovered the Bob Ross method of painting through his Joy of Painting programmes. The "wet-on-wet" technique uses oil paint applied to the canvas with a variety of brushes after coating the canvas with acrylic primer and linseed oil, and in front of our eyes Gill created a mountain landscape with a lake and trees which really looked as if it would have taken many hours, or even days, complete! Gill then very kindly donated her painting, which will be raffled at a future meeting.

On 8th August, 14 WI members enjoyed a trip to the Lady Lever Art Gallery at Port Sunlight, followed by an Afternoon Tea at Bellis's Garden

Holt. Centre at Everyone agreed that the morning spent at the hadn't Gallery been long enough to see everything it had to offer! Highlights includspecial the



exhibition of the charming illustrations from the Flower Fairies books by Cicely Mary Barker, key paintings by early and pre-Raphaelite and late Victorian artists. and the finest collection of Wedgwood in the world although there was so much else to see too! On the way back we stopped for Bellis's а truly delicious Afternoon Tea, and found time to explore their farm shop, plant nursery and gift shop before arriving back in Marbury in the late afternoon. All in all, a thoroughly enjoyable day out!

WILDLIFE IS GOOD FOR US!! Please join us for two gentle Saturday-morning strolls around different parts of Marbury looking at our beautiful wildlife. On 2nd September we will walk past the Big Mere and a little way up Wirswall Hill (you'll need your wellies!), and on Saturday 9th we'll go up School Lane and along the canal a little way towards Wrenbury.



Nature is important part of the world around us, and taking time to witness what's happening in the natural world can make a major contribution to our mental and spiritual wellbeing.

We are blessed in Marbury to have a particularly diverse range of bird life. Some species such as brightly coloured Yellow-hammers and cheeky Reed Buntings, that

are increasingly rare elsewhere, are doing well in our area. Our walks will take us past the regular haunts of Kingfishers, Mistle Thrushes, Kestrels, and the young Stonechats that have recently fledged in the village, which is quite a rare event for Cheshire. At this time of year, we might also see early migrants such as Wheatears, Redwings and Fieldfares. There's even a tiny chance of seeing the Osprey or the Marsh Harrier that have been in the area lately! And if we're not lucky with birds, perhaps we'll see a Stoat or some Hares, at least!

Both walks will start at 9am from the Church. Wellies or boots would be appropriate (especially for the Wirswall walk). You might want to bring binoculars if you have them.

MARBURY BELLES We organised one final summer trip, to Chester Zoo, for the Ukraine families who remained with their hosts. Our role as fund raisers for these families has now ceased. Since inception we have raised funds to help 20 families living in the



surrounding areas. However those numbers have now reduced to 9 as some families returned to their homeland. We have thoroughly enjoyed the work and we know that the families have appreciated the support but that of course has only been possible through your generous donations over the last eighteen months. So a huge thank you to each and every one of you who have helped us along the way.

After the August trip we shall still have funds in our account which will go to the Ukraine families but in a different format. Many of you will have met Luda and her three lovely children who lived in Whitchurch with Debbie and Robin Benson. Luda returned to the Ukraine a couple of months ago but remains in regular contact with her hosts. Luda sends lists to Debbie and Robin of items they desperately need, including items such as medicines (as simple as paracetamol, eye drops, throat lozenges, plasters), hygiene supplies, instant food (rice, canned food, dried fruit, coffee and tea), clothing and footwear. Debbie and Robin box up as many of these items as they can, they are collected and delivered direct to either Luda or her neighbour by a Ukraine courier. Delivery is therefore guaranteed and the items are shared between all friends and neighbours. They are hugely grateful. We will be putting together some of these boxes and the balance of our funds will go to Debbie and Robin for future packages.

Marbury Belles will now take a different course, we shall continue to raise charitable funds but our efforts will now turn towards two year old Vega Pryke, a little girl living locally who requires stem cell therapy. Shortly after birth Vega was diagnosed with Dyskinetic Cerebral Palsy and she has been fighting incredibly hard ever since to recover. Whilst Vega's mum, Alba, guides her through a gruelling five hour daily rehabilitation routine, the stem cell treatment will turbo charge her recovery. Treatments and developments for cerebral palsy have constantly evolved over the last decade and the latest stem cell treatments have shown life changing results for children with Vega's condition. However, treatment costs thousands, so in an effort to help raise some funds we shall start, in our traditional manner, with a coffee morning at the Village Hall on **Friday 8th September 10.00am to 12 noon. Hope to see you there.**

Arthur Morris killed in action 28th October 1944

Elaine Gathercole has contacted us regarding the above. She is carrying out research for the Overloon War Chronicles Foundation. Their aim is to find photos and create biographies of the men buried in Commonwealth War Graves so that their memory is kept alive into the future.

One of these men was Arthur Morris, born in Quoisley, Marbury 1910, to Tommy Morris and Alice Barlow who was also born in Marbury, and lived at Wirswall, moving later to Broughall.

Elaine has written summary of Arthur's life which is now posted on the Foundation Website https://www.overloonwarchronicles.nl/en/morris-arthur Elaine goes on to say that they have been unfortunate in not finding a photo of Arthur.

Arthur didn't marry or have children, so they are dependent upon 2nd 3rd 4th and 5th generation descendants of Aunts and Uncles to help.

Elaine realises it's a long shot to find a photo or information but has asked me to share this information. She hopes this information will be of interest to our community and to see if a photo can be traced. The Foundation places photos on the men's graves at key times and post them on the website.
