

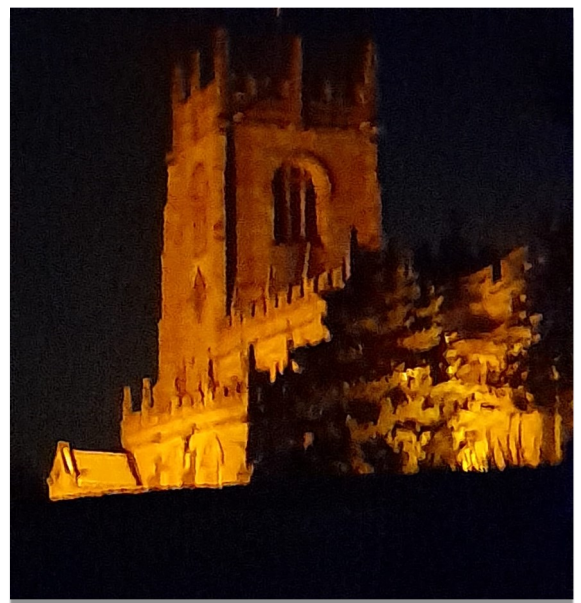

Parish Letter - December '24

PEACE...

Previously I've talked about stories and the power they hold—from ancient fables to Jesus's parables, to myths and legends, to current stories the world's press chooses to publish, and I wonder how much humankind is impacted by such words.

In the stillness of each morning, before anyone is awake, I search for Peace. I spend time with God, no-one else, and I cherish it. Then in just a couple hours the noise of the world and its stories can shatter the peace into tiny shards and, like splinters, they cause hurt, that hurt can lead very quickly to worry...and I know I'm not alone, am I?

ECO CHURCH

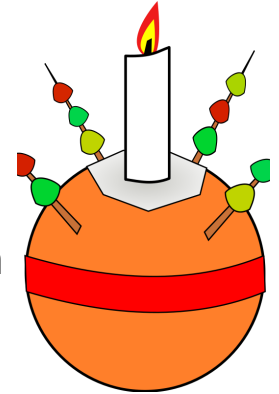
Don't forget to recycle used ink cartridges. Please place them at the back of church in the recycle bag. It's better for the environment and we get donations to give to charity. Its win! win!

PARISH COUNCIL

The meeting on 11th November was preceded by an open speaking session, with residents, the Police and a British Horse Society Road Safety Officer in attendance. Grave concerns regarding the safety of horse-riders, cyclists, pedestrians and all vulnerable road users had been put to the Parish Council.

Advice was given regarding prevention measures; ***always*** wear hi-vis clothing - particularly **horses** should be kitted with this. A Riding Out Safely course is run by the B.H.S. Bodycam is a useful addition, in case of an incident, and the record can be submitted to the Police for action. There will be patrols in the area to look out for cases of unreasonable driving.

All road users are asked to help with their own safety by acting in a considerate and safe manner; incidents should always be reported to the Police (and B.H.S.) so statistics can be collated. If “delivery drivers” are noted—either as good or of concern—these should be reported also direct to the transport company. It was agreed that many drivers are uneducated in the ways of countryside driving, something which used to be promoted on T.V. years ago!

The Parish Council meeting followed with discussions about the Play Area maintenance, the perennial Highways matters, and Planning Applications .

Revd. Veronica gave an update of church activities; Bickley Church is now part of the Benefice, and she gave a summary of the many church services at Marbury over the Christmas period.

Ongoing concerns about vehicles being parked on the pavement outside The Swan, causing danger to pedestrians, will be referred to the Police and C.E. for resolution.

Residents are welcome to attend meetings; however, if you wish to speak at the meeting, please contact the Chair or the Clerk beforehand. Public speaking time is limited and only Councillors may take part in discussions/decisions. The next meeting will be on Monday, 13th January, 7.30 p.m. at the Village Hall.

Able Community Care is a Norfolk, family owned, Home Care provider which was established in 1980. We are often asked about a wide range of care issues. Care information is often time-consuming and difficult to access, so we are happy to share some of our questions and answers with you.

Question – I have heard on the media that many older people are entitled to but are not claiming Pension Credit. How do I find out about it?

Answer – The simplest way is to Google ‘**Pension Credit – How to Claim**’- which will give you all the information around eligibility and claiming.

If you do not have access to the internet, you can call the Pension Credit claim line on 0800 99 1234 and they can fill in the application for you over the phone (lines are open Monday to Friday, 8am-6pm).

Question – A friend has mentioned that I may be able to claim a Carer’s Allowance as I look after my elderly mum who has health problems. Where can I find out details and how much. is the weekly benefit?

Answer - The simplest way is to visit the Gov.UK website and search for Carer’s Allowance. Eligibility details and how to claim plus further information can be found there.

You could receive £81.90 a week if you care for at least 35 hours a week and your mum is in receipt of certain benefits.

Question – I think I could benefit from a wheelchair. Can I get one on the NHS? Do I have to pay for maintenance and if it needs repairing? How long does it take to get one and how do I find out if I am eligible?

Answer – Wheelchairs from the NHS are free and maintained and repaired by the NHS at no charge. They do however, remain the property of the NHS so cannot be handed on.

Eligibility is that an individual must, as a result of a permanent disability or medical condition, have a mobility problem that persists for more than 6 months, or require palliative care. A wheelchair should be required for regular use (at least three days per week). The user must be functionally unable to walk and need a wheelchair for independent mobility

The first step to see if you can get a prescription for a wheelchair is to visit your GP and explain your needs. The waiting time can vary from a few weeks to three-four months.

Question – What is the fine for misusing a Blue Badge?

Answer - It is a criminal offence to misuse the badge, and doing so can lead to a £1,000 fine or more. Councils take court actions each year for misuse of the badge.

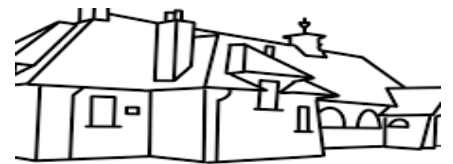
