What If?

Are you living your best life? I met a delightful young person this week who would say yes to this question. He travels extensively, has a job that many would dream of and has over a million followers through social media; yet we found ourselves in a field chatting about faith.

The funny thing is, it was the most natural thing in the world at that moment, and even though the conversation needed to end as he was catching a train to London, neither of us wanted it to finish!

I spoke to someone older recently too, and a similar conversation took place. I remember saying to both, 'There's much more to being human beings than we realise there is.'

Being human is the most wonderful simple but complicated mystery - how do we define who we are, why we are, where we are?

They don't teach this in schools as far as I remember, or college or university. It seems to me this is something we learn through living the experience of our lives; piecing together the ups and downs, the traumas, the celebrations, the humdrum day to day things we learn to deal with. Key to this is time to reflect on those things – but sadly very few of us do.

What if Jesus came to the earth to learn what it's like to be human? What if the One who created humans wanted to understand his creation? What if God realised that what he made needed help to understand themselves and why they were created in the first place? What if we are failing to live the best life we could?

'Because of the Lord's great love we are not consumed, for His compassion never fails. They are new every morning; great is His faithfulness.' In a time of fear and overwhelming change, (circa 586 BC) the prophet Jeremiah wrote these words to a people who were struggling because they were human. These words are not empty words, written to bring a little reassurance but words of truth from a man who heard from God and spoke on His behalf, words of promise that gave hope.

If you are struggling with simply being human, is it time you reached out and sought the One who understand you better than you understand you?

We are 'fearfully and wonderfully' made; wouldn't you like to explore what that means? Wouldn't you like to know what God's plan is for each of us, for this world, for your children and their children?

What if - God is real? As real as You...

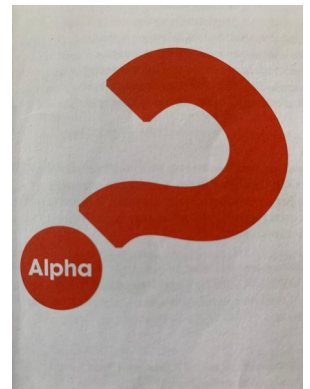

Question – Who can drive a person's Mobility Car? Can family, friends, neighbours, if needed or wanting to take a person with a disability out?

Answer - Only drivers approved by DLM's criteria and named under the 'permitted drivers' section of the Certificate of Motor Insurance are covered to drive a Mobility vehicle. Many drivers assume that if they have their own fully comprehensive insurance cover they can drive a Scheme vehicle but, unless they have been added to the lease as a driver, they are not able to. Three named drivers for the vehicle are allowed, including the person with a disability.

Question – What 'Meals on Wheels Services' are available in my area? Are there small, local ones, rather than the larger, franchise ones, which we could use?

Answer - Meals on Wheels UK is a website created by the University of Bristol which provides a searchable database of information on providers who deliver both fresh and frozen meals across the UK. Just put a postcode in, and all local and national providers will come up with contact details, website, etc.

Question – I need some help to get an older relative's feet looked after. Where can I get such help, and does it have to be paid for?

Answer - If it is a foot condition that limits movement, then your relative may qualify for free chiropodist and podiatry services through the NHS. Many Age UK branches also have trained workers who will provide a basic level of foot care, such as toenail cutting, and can offer general guidance. If such footcare is not freely available in the area then you will have to pay a podiatrist, also known as a chiropodist, to get the help needed. To find one locally, visit the regulating body, the Royal College of Podiatry's website for a list of their members.

Question – Being a person with a disability I can purchase some pieces of equipment and other things VAT-free. Can I do this with the online retailer Amazon?

Answer - Amazon can issue VAT refunds on eligible sales to customers who are registered disabled or chronically ill. To apply for your VAT refund, after your order has been completed, you'll need to fill out an eligibility declaration form, which can be requested from their Customer Service department, or obtained directly from HMRC (HMRC Notice 701/7 VAT reliefs for disabled people). Visit their websites for further details.

Meeting on 10th April: summary of business -

PC to liaise with Police/Wrenbury P.C. re Operation Park Safe and other traffic matters. Neighbourhood Plan in draft form with C.E. Change Banking Provider because of closure of TSB. Updates regarding Police Cluster meetings, church activities, highways and grounds maintenance. SPEN to move the overhead power line in the village. Discussion re Neighbourhood Community Infrastructure Levy (NCIL) grant of £1152; suggestions from community for suitable project/s. Suggested Electric Charger point at VH but concerns re parking access etc.

No Planning Applications.

Request received for a Dog Waste Bin at School Lane/Church Bridge. C.E. would not supply bins but provide signs promoting dog walkers to take their poo bags home—and not hang them from hedges!!!

Annual Parish Meeting, Thursday, 15th May, followed by the PC AGM.

Chair, Councillor Joe Briggs thanked Councillors and residents for their contribution to the community over the past year. Summaries of organisations' events were given—the Church, WI., and Village Hall.

Councillor Briggs was re-elected as Chair, Councillor Wilson as Vice-Chair. There were updates on parish matters, including signage warning about dog-fouling, provision of goalposts for the play area, and grounds maintenance. Jane Lunt was thanked for Auditing the P.C. Accounts. The P.C. Facebook page had been produced and was active. Police have warned about burglaries from outbuildings and of fraud scams. Councillors were invited to join Wrenbury P.C. at a meeting about the Police Park Safe scheme.

The next meeting is scheduled for 14th July.
