

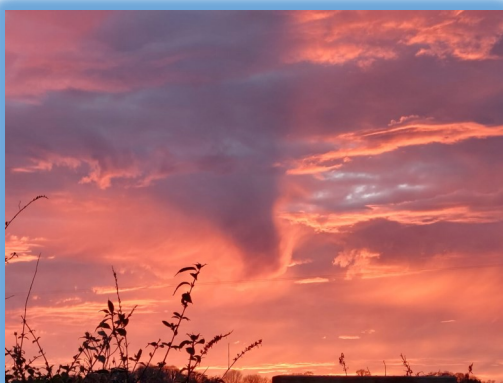

Winter

I wonder if you have ever thought of Winter as a Season of Sabbath. Spring and Summer are times of growth and flourishing and Autumn brings us all the bounty of those growing months in its abundance and plenty. The fruitfulness of autumn is displayed most visually in the fields ripe for harvest and in the trees full of their own offerings of seeds, nuts and berries and, then, the final shedding of russet red and golden leaves.

Winter is a different story. A season where nature withdraws, holding herself in stillness until the world turns again and spring is once more on the way. The cold and darkness wrap the earth and all is put away for another year. Even some of our native animals turn in for the winter.

Sabbath time is a time of resting, reflecting and refreshing. Sabbath time does not mean just Sundays, it can be any time we can take to be still and quiet, and in these long and dark evenings we may find we have time to do that.

Our 24/7, noisy and demanding world, expects us to carry on just the same, and this is maybe why many struggle through the winter months. Sabbath is when we can take some time to withdraw from the busyness of our lives, to draw breath and give ourselves some time to slow down, to rest and reflect in peace.

Perhaps this year we could look at this winter season a little differently and embrace the Winter Sabbath and use it in the same way nature does: as a time for reflecting, resting, snuggling down and preparing for next year's growth.

Jesus often took himself away for some peace and quiet; to pray, rest and listen - he never felt guilty about it and encouraged it in others. The message he left us tells us all we need to know about being human in an ever-changing world. It is perhaps no coincidence that the Light of the World comes to us at the darkest time of the year.

These changes are simply being made to accommodate the people who lead the services and, hopefully, all those who attend.

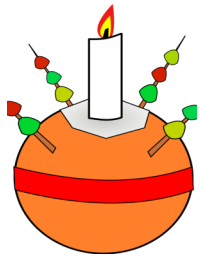
Safeguarding

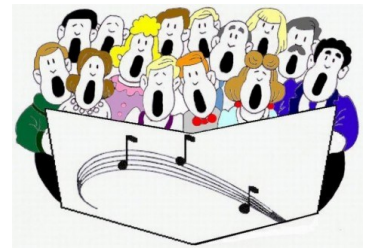
Protection, Accountability and Transparency are key aspects in relation to Safeguarding. Stay safe and let's be sure others are safe.

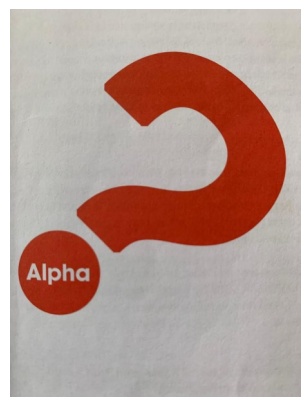

The NHS Dentist two-year rule means you should not wait more than two years between check-ups. If you don't see your NHS dentist within this time, you might lose your registration as an NHS patient.

An NHS community matron is a highly experienced, senior nurse who provides intensive, personalised care to patients with complex long-term conditions, helping them to manage their health at home and avoid hospital admissions. They act as case managers, coordinating with GPs, other health professionals, and social care to create care plans, monitor conditions, and provide advanced nursing interventions. There are approximately 2,000 Community Matrons in the UK. Refer to your local surgery for further information on local availability.

Winter Safety Tip: Hot Water Bottle Safety

For a cosy and safe autumn, the NHS and safety experts recommend checking your hot water bottle for age and damage. Before first use in Autumn and to avoid burns and leaks from degraded rubber, follow these steps before you start using your hot water bottle for the season.

- Check the expiration date. Hot water bottles should be replaced every two years, even if they look fine.
- Find the "daisy wheel". A date stamp, often shaped like a flower, is usually found on the neck or body of the bottle.
 - The central number is the manufacturing year (e.g., '22' for 2022).
 - The twelve segments represent the months. Filled segments indicate the month it was made.
 - Inspect for wear and tear. Look for cracks, splits, discolouration, or brittle areas. Do not use the bottle if you notice any damage.
 - Check for leaks. Fill the bottle with cool water, insert the stopper tightly, and turn it upside down to see if any water leaks out.

In addition, never use boiling water, and always use a protective cover.
